Who does DA BUX help in Honolulu County?

In 2023, a projected 136,000 DA BUX transactions were issued, totaling \$1.2 million in discounts, which translates to \$2.4 million in local produce purchases by low-income SNAP shoppers in Honolulu County.



WHAT IS DA BUX?

"DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks" (also known as "DA BUX") is a statewide nutrition incentive program that partners with grocery stores and food hubs to offer 50% discounts on Hawai'i grown fruits and vegetables to lowincome shoppers paying with federal food benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), formerly known as "food stamps."




Given the highly sensitive nature of supplier data within the grocery industry, the farm producer count only reflects vendor data collected from participating food hubs.

How does DA BUX impact Honolulu County's

food industry?

Out of 5 participating food hubs in Honolulu County, 3 food hubs reported increases in local produce sales to SNAP shoppers. In 2023, these food hubs are projected to increase local produce sales to SNAP shoppers by an average of 297%.

Local Produce Sales to SNAP Shoppers at Food Hubs





How does DA BUX impact health outcomes for Honolulu County residents?

In 2023, Honolulu County DA BUX participants reported consuming an average of **2.75 cups of fruits and vegetables per day**,² which is greater than the consumption level of the average U.S. adult of 2.53 cups of fruits and vegetables per day.³ This outcome is consistent with the national findings of the Gretchen Swanson Center for Nutrition, reporting higher fruit and vegetable consumption among participants of nutrition incentives than the average U.S. adult.⁴

²Surveys included a 10-question Dietary Screener Questionnaire (DSQ) developed by the National Cancer Institute evaluating fruit and vegetable intake. A total of 234 Honolulu County DA BUX participants returned surveys with completed DSQ modules in 2022, and 97 participants in 2023.
